I am so proud to be your pastor! It has to be said that our fundraisers, both the Art Festival and the Appraisal Fair and Auction, are needed to make that budget balance. It's important that we continue to strive toward not depending on fundraisers. Ideally fundraisers would be used exclusively for our ministries. I know you can do it because I have seen how much you can accomplish when you are determined!

The past year at Shepherd of the Valley has been filled with joys and challenges. We have been blessed to have two babies be born into our family. Lead by our family ministry coordinator our children continue to grow and thrive in their faith. They clearly know we are the people we belong to. God's people in need. Some of us have marched to stand for gun safety laws, climate justice and immigration justice. Linda Osborne has started a new small group to support our seniors with needs specific to them and our devoted outreach team continues to serve our shut ins.

While we have much to feel grateful for, we do have some very serious challenges. The issues related to our denomination have impacted our church. We are a proudly reconciling church and the decision of the 2019 General Conference was deeply painful. Some of our members are understandably struggling to discern if they can continue to maintain their connection with the United Methodist Church. But we have committed to holding on together in hope that something new will be birthed out of what has happened.

Our greatest challenge quite frankly is finances. We cannot continue to maintain our current budget based our current giving and fundraisers. It is becoming harder and harder to get people to participate in our primary fundraisers which are not currently adequate. Although SOV is alive and spirit and ministry we need to have a very serious discussion about whether the church can continue at the current level of staffing. This is a painful subject for any church. My hope is that we can proceed from a place of hope and not fear. Just as families who are under financial stress grow in tension, often when churches begin to have these conversations people get scared and relationships break down. Let us lovingly discern what God is calling us to do together.

On a personal level, I continue to see my spiritual director and my covenant group. I have finally been able to build close working relationships with other local clergy. We meet regularly and have created an ecumenical Thanksgiving Day service. We are exploring ways to do ministry together. I want to express my appreciation for the support SOV has given me for my work with the District and the Conference. I feel called to be a mentor and support for other clergy. When you support me in that work you are having a direct

impact on the future of our church. Together we are doing kingdom work.

I feel deeply privileged to be serving Shepherd of the Valley. Thank you for partnering with me in responding to God's call to Sing God's Grace into the world, inviting all, serving all, loving all.

Stewardship Campaign: Thank You!

Our 2020 stewardship campaign has finished and the results are in. You made it a resounding success! You listened to what was needed to support Shepherd of the Valley, and responded generously. Most importantly, in 2020 our missions and ministry will be fully funded, thanks to you. Forty-one families increased their pledges and there were seven new pledges, yielding an 18% increase in giving. This means we will have a balanced budget for the first time in several years. With your show of support, we can continue to have a full-time minister. While the future of the United Methodist Church is up in the air, you have shown the Shepherd of the Valley stands strong.

2020 Budget

Attached please find the SOV 2020 budget, passed at an open Church Council meeting on January 12, 2020. The exhibit displays details for the 2020 budget including the projection for 2019 and actual 2018 data for comparison purposes. You will note that, thanks to the congregation's generosity, this budget is balanced. Your pledges represent over \$16,000 in additional revenues. Most other income is based on last year's revenues, with fundraisers calculated using an average of past years. Expenses are based on 2019, with no staff salary increases, and insurance and Mission Shares as provided by the Conference.

Electronic Funds Transfer

Electronic funds transfer (EFT) is an easy way to make your regular gifts to SOV. Simply fill out the form (available through the church) and your specified amount will be withdrawn from your checking account on a regular (weekly, monthly, etc.) basis. No more remembering your envelope, no more forgetting to bring a check, no more having to catch up if you've been away or missed a Sunday. EFT also helps the church's cash flow as we can depend on a regular income over the course of the year rather than the hills and valleys of cash/check giving.

EFT Reminder

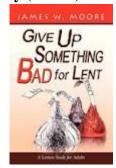
If you give using electronic funds transfers and have changed your pledge amount, you need to complete a new EFT form. They are available through the church office or in the narthex.

Women in Spiritual Harmony (WISH)

Music Matters

Research has shown that singing in a choir or playing a musical instrument in a band or orchestra has a variety of cognitive and psychological benefits. Psychologically, it can relieve depression, quell symptoms of anxiety, and improve overall mood and well-being. Physiologically, it has been shown to regulate heartbeat, lower blood pressure, improve stamina, and strengthen the immune system. (And you can achieve all this by joining Shepherd of the Valley's Adult Choir!)

There are benefits to musical experience throughout lift. Those who had musical experience in their younger years demonstrated continued cognitive and neural benefits, which continued through life. There may be particular benefits for older folks. According to a study published in *Hearing Journal*, older adults without any musical experience improved processing speed and memory after just three months of 30-minute piano lessons and three hours of practicing each week. Musical involvement may even counteract negative effects of aging such as memory and hearing loss.

And those of you listening to our choir, don't despair. Even listening to music can lower stress hormones and provide other health benefits. Music can bring benefits to our lives in many ways and forms.

Church Council Minutes January 12, 2020

Church Council members present included Howard and Linda Gay, Barbara Walz, Jerry Crosby, Martha Ahern, Meg Davis, Lisa Marciniak, John Lombardo, Loxi Ellingwood, Tom Senerchia, and Hannah Bell-Lombardo. Pastor Katherine Mitchell was in attendance as were members of the congregation.

John called the meeting was called to order at 10:44 a.m. in the sanctuary. He noted that we were short about \$11,000 for 2019 Mission Shares, also noting that paying our full Mission Shares has

been a priority of our church. The Pastor's Pension portion was paid in full. John recounted District Superintendent Andrew Foster's remarks during our annual Church Conference that we needed to step up our Mission Shares payment in order to maintain a full-time pastor. Since our expenses are so lean, the only way to do this was to increase our giving. Our fall stewardship campaign was able to accomplish this, representing increased giving that allows us to balance our budget, paying Mission Shares in full. John thanked the church for its response to this challenge.

He briefly reviewed the 2020 budget (copy available on request). Expenses are similar to last year's. Staff salaries for the pastor, sexton, secretary, and music director are flat. The insurance expenses and Mission Shares amounts are given us by Annual Conference. Utilities are based on the prior year, with the exception of electricity, which was unusually low last year due to a mild winter and is budgeted at a higher amount. For the Art Festival, he used an average of the last 10 years. Continuation of this effort, along with other fundraising efforts, is being coordinated by a new committee chaired by Sandy Knapp and Meg. It was noted that fundraisers should be used for mission projects and not to help balance the operating budget.

Congregation member Bill Flug commended the congregation as a group of committed people who understand SOV and did what needed to be done, noting that we need to do this again next year.

Jerry moved that the budget be accepted, Tom seconded, and the motion was unanimously passed. Katherine noted that it was a proud moment to be a pastor.

Meeting was adjourned at 11:02 a.m.
